Technology Based Approaches

- Student demand for technology based approaches is increasing – need for increased flexibility
- Universities also consider online teaching as having considerable benefits – particularly economic
- Legal professional bodies are increasingly recognising digital literacy as a core competency

‘Technological tools are no different than, for example, cars: Their value depends on what we do with them and why’

Technology Based Approaches (cont'd)

- Technology based approaches can include electronic resources as a teaching tool – e.g. support activities for face-to-face teaching (I WILL FOCUS ON THIS!)
- It can also refer to a whole-of-course pedagogical* approach – e.g. use of videoconferencing to deliver an entire course

*Pedagogy = the method and practice of teaching

Practice of Online Research

- Students increasingly undertake online research for both long assignments but also indulge in ‘smart prep’ before class
- Teachers also therefore are required to at least undertake online searches on the lecture topic as part of their preparation – so as not be caught off guard !!
- But instead of looking at this as a challenge for the teacher – this can itself be designed as a preparatory assignment for students before the class
 - Legislative developments (including parliamentary questions)+ policies + judicial rulings + developments in other jurisdictions + good academic articles on the subject



Nature of Online Legal Resources

- Academic Articles
- Case Law
- Current Affairs – ongoing disputes
- Recorded Lectures/Films



Incorporation of Online Resources

- Incorporating online resources just as supplementary readings – will be less useful – until linked to a practical assignment in class/ community activity.
- Watching a lecture/film in class – followed by a discussion
- Reading of an online article – followed by a reflection paper and class/tutorial discussion
- Moot Courts – Hypothetical disputes based fact situations drawn from multiple actual disputes
