Background

Environmental degradation threatens ecosystems, food and water security, and livelihoods, particularly for the poor, exacerbating climate change impacts. Illegal activities, weak governance, and ineffective implementation, compliance and enforcement of laws worsen most environmental problems. Moreover, limited expertise in environmental and emerging climate change laws in government, judiciaries, academia, and the private sector impede sustainability. Although the demand for environmental law expertise is growing—driven by new policies and laws and, sometimes, new specialist environmental law courts—there are insufficient numbers of suitably qualified environmental law experts to advise governments, courts, the private sector, and others seeking environment and climate change expertise.

A significant challenge in meeting the increasing need for environmental and climate change experts is the lack of capacity and investment in legal education. The teaching of environmental law is currently under-resourced and inadequate in almost all countries in Asia and the Pacific, even those that have decreed the subject mandatory within a basic law degree curriculum. Furthermore, since the COVID-19 pandemic, there has been a shift to online learning and legal education needs to adapt to new modalities such as online and hybrid teaching.

Over the years, ADB has supported capacity development for environmental law academics through the *Developing Environmental Law Champions Program*, currently supported under ADB regional technical assistance entitled "Strengthening the Capacity for Environmental and Climate Change Laws in Asia and the Pacific" (TA). The TA has three components: (i) improving the quality of teaching of environmental and climate change through train-the-trainers (TTT) programs; (ii) expanding national, subregional, and regional networks; and (iii) enhancing knowledge platforms to increase national and regional expertise.

In the Philippines, the Legal Education Board (LEB), as administrator of the legal education system, has initiated a series of reforms in the training and education of future legal professionals. One key reform has been the revision and modernization of the existing model law curriculum into the Revised Model Law Curriculum (RMLC), which provides for the mandatory teaching of environmental law as a non-core subject in Philippine law schools.

In 2021, upon the request of the LEB, the Asian Development Bank (ADB), the United Nations Environment Programme, and the IUCN Academy of Environmental Law, supported a 12-week capacity development program for more than 100 legal educators from across the Philippines. This Environmental Law Teachers Online Training Program ran from September 22 to December 8, 2021, and covered curriculum development and best practice in environmental and climate change law teaching.





Following the initial program's success, and to further support the LEB's request for additional capacity building and development of a Model Environmental Law Syllabus, a second Environmental Law Faculty Training will be conducted on 27 and 28 October 2022 at ADB headquarters in Manila and via Zoom.

The objectives of the 2-day hybrid-training event are to:

- 1. Update environmental law educators in the Philippines with best practices in effective pedagogy, including online and hybrid teaching pedagogy.
- 2. Explore lessons from the COVID-19 pandemic and innovations in distance learning and online pedagogy
- 3. Introduce the draft Model Environmental Law Curriculum and discuss its applicability to the development of a Philippines Model Environmental Law Syllabus, which will help implement the reforms under the Revised Model Law Curriculum adopted in 2021.
- 4. Foster networking and knowledge-sharing between environmental law professors and academics in the Philippines.

Participants will be given opportunities to develop teaching modules and be provided with practical training and skills development. Time will also be available to review online materials to support environmental law teaching and research.

ADB will support national and international resource persons including Professors Amanda Kennedy, Grizelda Mayo Anda, Rose Liza Osorio, Jonathan Liljeblad, Joyce Melcar Tan and Dr. Georgina Lloyd (see attached their short bios and pictures). ADB will also provide technical and administrative support for the 2nd Environmental Law Faculty Training.

It is anticipated that approximately 40 law professors will attend in-person and up to 70 law professors will participate online, for a total of approximately 110 participants.

LEB will provide to ADB a list of registered participants so that the 2nd Environmental Law Faculty Training can be tailored accordingly.

The draft program is attached to this concept note.

Training materials will be circulated in advance of the training.

Logistical note for in-person and Zoom participants will be provided prior to the training program.

Hon. Maria Filomena D. Singh

Associate Justice Supreme Court of the Philippines

Hon. Justice Maria Filomena D. Singh earned her Juris Doctor degree from the Ateneo de Manila University School of Law with Second Honors distinction. She practiced law for 10 years before joining the Judiciary in October 2002 as the Presiding Judge of Branch 31 of the Metropolitan Trial Court of Quezon City.

In 2021, Justice Singh was appointed as the Expert Resource Person of the Legal Education Board Curriculum Revision Committee, in the crafting of the Revised Model Curriculum for legal education. On 18 May 2022, Justice Singh took her oath before Chief Justice Alexander G. Gesmundo as the 194th Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, replacing Senior Associate Justice Estela M. Perlas-Bernabe.

Currently, Justice Singh is the Chairperson of the Technical Working Group on the Compilation of the Rules of Pleading, Practice and Procedure; the Co-Chairperson of the Committee of Gender Responsiveness in the Judiciary; and the Vice Chairperson of the Sub-Committee for the Revision of the Code of Professional Responsibility. Justice Singh is also the Working Vice Chairperson of the Sub-Committee for the Revision of the Rules of Civil Procedure, and a member of the Technical Working Group on Electronic Notarization.



Thomas C. Clark General Counsel Asian Development Bank

Mr. Thomas Clark holds a Doctor of Laws degree from Columbia University, where he was Notes Editor of the Columbia Law Review, and a Bachelor of Arts degree in Government from Harvard University. He has over 30 years of experience in legal and government affairs practice, spanning the financial services, energy, and infrastructure sectors. After a judicial clerkship on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit, and legal practice at the law firms of Sullivan & Cromwell in New York and WilmerHale in Washington, D.C., Mr. Clark joined the General Electric Company, one of the world's largest infrastructure and technology companies. His 22-year career at GE included 16 years based in Japan and covering the Asia-Pacific region, as General Counsel for GE's largest Asian financial services arm, and as Executive Counsel for Government Affairs and Policy, working with regulators and governments throughout the region on key legal and policy initiatives, and holding leadership roles in industry associations and private sector advisory bodies for APEC and ASEAN.

Chairperson Anna Marie Melanie B. Trinidad took her pre-law in the University of Sto. Tomas, obtaining a BS Degree in Industrial Engineering in 1990. She then obtained her Bachelor of Laws (LLB) in the San Beda University in 1999 and took that year's Bar and became a lawyer in the year 2000.

Chairperson Trinidad worked with the Hon. Justice Josue N. Bellosillo, as an Associate Lawyer at the Angara Abello Concepcion Regala and Cruz Law Offices or ACCRALAW for two (2) years.
